

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



More info: 1906 Objects - promotion of business interests, promotion of good fellowship and the advancement of the best interests of the community

More info: 1910 had 5 Objects, 1915 had 6 Objects. It changed several times until we got the final 4 in 1935 at the International Convention in Mexico City

• Emphasize there are (4) parts but will primarily cover the First Object; the others will be covered in the appropriate courses.

The Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

The Object of Rotary

The Two Most Challenging Questions for a Rotarian

- 1. What is Rotary?
- 2. What is Rotary's purpose?

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PROCESS:

- Ask the question: What is Rotary? Let as many of the class have a shot at it as time permits.
- Ask the 2nd question: What is Rotary's purpose? Let as many of the class have a shot at it as time permits.
- Try and get the class to circle back to 'the Object of Rotary' as they develop their answers.
- How many Objects of Rotary, and How Many Avenues of Service?

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Object of Rotary

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- I. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- II. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to service society;
- III. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- IV. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

INTERNATIONAL

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

As a Rotarian, I will:

- 1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life
- 2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
- 3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world

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8 Rotary International Programs

Interact is a service organization organized and sponsored by Rotary clubs for youth ages **12-18**. It has more than 14,900 clubs in 145 countries and geographical areas with almost 342,900 young people involved.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) are seminars sponsored by clubs and districts to encourage and recognize the leadership abilities of youth and young adults ages 14-30.

Rotary Peace Fellowships promote national and international cooperation, peace and the successful resolution of conflict through educating Rotary Peace Fellows, selected for their outstanding academic, civic, and humanitarian activities.

Autonomous, international groups. Rotarian Action Groups provide assistance and support to Rotary clubs and districts in planning and implementing service projects in their respective areas of expertise. They are comprised of Rotarians, Rotarian spouses and Rotaractors who have expertise in and a passion for a particular type of service.

Rotary Youth Exchange offers students ages 15-19 the chance to travel abroad for cultural exchanges of one week to a full academic year.

Rotary clubs and districts sponsor and host about 8000 students each year.

Rotary Friendship Exchange encourages Rotarians and their families to make reciprocal visits to other countries, staying in each other's homes and learning about different cultures firsthand.

Rotary Community Corps (RCC) are groups of non-Rotarians who work to improve their communities. There are over 11,000 RCC in over 100 countries, all organized and sponsored by Rotary Clubs.

Rotary Fellowships are autonomous, international groups of Rotarians, Rotarian spouses and Rotaractors who join together for any number of reasons, including fellowship, vocational development, make new friends and explore new opportunities for service.

The first Interact club was chartered Nov 5 1962 at Melbourne High School in Florida.



What is Vocational Service

Evolution from Vocational Emphasis to Service

Have any of the early Ethical & Vocational principals carried over to today's Rotary?

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PROCESS:

Discuss a working definition of what Vocational Service is.

Rotary began as a vocational club – men of different professions coming together to network. Within two years, they did their first service project (a comfort station in Chicago).

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PROCESS:

From the earliest days of the organization, Rotarians were concerned with promoting high ethical standards in their professional lives. One of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics is The Four-Way Test, which was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor (who later served as RI president) when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy.

In the early 1930s <u>Herbert J. Taylor</u> set out to save the Club Aluminum Products distribution company from bankruptcy. He believed himself to be the only person in the company with 250 employees who had hope. His recovery plan started with changing the ethical climate of the company.

In the 1940s, when Taylor was an international director of Rotary, he offered the Four Way Test to the organization, and it was adopted by Rotary for its internal and promotional use. Never changed, the twenty-four-word test remains today a central part of the permanent Rotary structure throughout the world and is held as the standard by which all behavior should be measured. The test has been promoted around the world and is used in myriad forms to encourage personal and business ethical practices. [3] Taylor gave Rotary International the right to use the test in the 1940s and the copyright in 1954. He retained the rights to use the test for himself, his Club Aluminum Company and the Christian Workers Foundation.

• The Four Way Test is not part of the Rotary By-Laws.

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

is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

- This is the absolute simplest explanation of the Foundation and should sum up what they know about the Foundation.
- Goal is to make the Foundation simple to understand and demystify it for the average Rotarian.

NOTE: The Rotary Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation that supports the efforts of Rotary International to achieve world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational, and cultural exchange programs. Remember, the Rotary Foundation is independent from Rotary International.





- Under "who can give" make sure they mention people who are not Rotarians! Companies, organizations, and your next-door neighbor. Anyone can give!


- Encourage attendees to go to Charity Navigator and look up some of their favorite or well-known charities. Four major cancer charities were fined in excess of \$75 million in 2015, after raising over \$187 million. Two of them were shut down amidst ongoing investigations. Lots of other charities may skirt the edge. Might this have been prevented by using Charity Navigator or other available rating agencies?
- The Rotary Foundation has scored a perfect 4 for 15 years so far! (as of October 2023)
- Question: do you know anything about other charities you might support?



- Brief discussion on the flow of funds and where contributions can go.
- Annual Fund and Endowment Fund are investment funds.
- PolioPlus and Disaster Response are a pass-through accounts (funds spent immediately)
- IF it comes up: The Peace Fellow Fund is a pass-through account as well.
- Discuss where different types of giving default:
 - o "live money" defaults to Annual Fund (money given while you live)
 - o "dead money" <u>defaults</u> to Endowment Fund (money left in wills, etc)
 - Donors can specify where the money goes no matter which investment fund they use.

NOTES

Try to avoid going into a discussion about points.



- Question: how many of your club's bill Foundation giving on the club invoice?
- How many of you go to Rotary.org to make your donations?
- Does anyone do Rotary Direct? If yes, can they explain it?
- Why is this the first choice?
- This is the default fund for money given while you are alive (PHF, Major Donor, EREY, etc)



The Endowment Fund



- Permanently invested, the corpus is never touched
- The interest is spent as directed by the donor
- Often designated in a will or as a beneficiary
- Ensures the long-term viability of the Foundation's grants & programs

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PROCESS:

- This is the <u>default</u> fund for money given after your death (Bequest, Benefactor)
- What is the estimated value of the Endowment Fund Today? As of June 2023 the fund has \$678.6 million in hand and commitments of \$948 million. (total: \$1.63 Billion)
- Only the earnings are spent. In 2022-23 that was \$25.8 Million
- By comparison, does anyone know the value of Harvard's endowed Fund?

Estimated to be over \$35 Billion!





- Money cannot be designated for a particular disaster
- · Can only be spent on Disasters

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PROCESS:

- This is a new fund created in 2019.
- It has been used for natural disasters, Covid response, and in Ukraine.
- Money can NOT be designated for a specific disaster.

NOTES:

• Only if you are asked – Yes, you get Paul Harris points for donating to this fund.

Polio Plus



- · Money is committed and spent as it comes in
- Can only be spent on Polio
- Gates Foundation match is 2 to 1
- · When Polio is gone, so is this account!

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Why is Rotary committed to eradicating polio?

Adopted by the Board of Trustees January 2015, submitted to the 2016 COL

IT IS RESOLVED by the 2016 Council on Legislation that Rotary International

- affirms and endorses that the goal of certification of the worldwide eradication of all polioviruses is of the highest priority for this association,
- affirms that no other corporate project should be adopted until the certification of the eradication of the all polioviruses, and
- confirms that, in accordance with 2004 Council on Legislation Resolution 04-525, no other corporate program will be adopted until approved by a subsequent Council.

Note: This resolution stays in effect until Polio is eradicated or until the COL reverses it



Polio

The Rotary Board of Directors "affirms and endorses that the goal of certification of the worldwide eradication of all polioviruses is of the highest priority for this association"

- Come prepared with the current data.
- We already saw that Polio is the highest priority. What should Rotary do after polio?



Some Foundation Facts

Rotary Centers for International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution:

There are 7 Rotary Peace Centers located around the world,

- Bahçeşehir University (BAU), Istanbul, Turkey (certificate only)
- Duke University and UNC at Chapel Hill, USA
- International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan
- University of Bradford, Bradford, England
- University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia
- Uppsala University, Uppsala, Sweden
- Makerere University, Kampala, Uganda (certificate only)

PolioPlus:

- PolioPlus grants provide polio vaccines and mobilize community resources to support international efforts to immunize children and eradicate polio worldwide. Rotarians' contributions to the global polio eradication effort exceed \$1.5 billion and have immunized over 2.5 billion children. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has partnered with Rotary and to date contributed well over \$.5 billion to the effort. They continue to match the first \$50 million Rotary raises every year, through 2025, 2 to 1. That's up to \$100 million in additional funds to the effort, every year.
- The "Plus" in Polio Plus is for the 5 other children's diseases covered in the vaccination: Measles, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, and tuberculosis.

PolioPlus Partners:

- Rotary has teamed up with the United National Foundation, World Health Organization, the US Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)
- Rotary clubs, districts, and individual Rotarians may voluntarily help reach Rotary's goal of a polio-free world. As PolioPlus Partners, individuals may volunteer in National Immunization Days (NIDs) and provide resources at risk for polio.

ADDITIONAL FOUNDATION FACTS:

Humanitarian Programs

A prerequisite for Rotary Foundation grant support, except for District Grants is that a project must be international. To be considered international, a project must involve active participation by a reasonable number of Rotarians in the benefiting country and at least one other country.

- <u>District Grants.</u> District grants provide an opportunity for districts to use a portion of their District Designated Funds (DDF) to implement humanitarian projects. Districts may choose to undertake a large service project or support endeavors of clubs. Maximum funding is 50% of the district's newly credited DDF.
- <u>Global Grants</u>. Global Grants assist Rotary clubs and districts in carrying out humanitarian service projects in cooperation with a Rotary Club or district in another country. Grants fund projects addressing one or more of the Seven Areas of Focus, with required means to address sustainability after completion. The minimum project size is \$30,000.

Vocational Training Teams

Vocational training teams are groups of professionals traveling abroad to either learn more about their profession or teach local professionals about a particular field.

The team...

- May build the capacity of either the team itself or a specific beneficiary community
- May be carried out in conjunction with a humanitarian project or scholarship
- May be multi-vocational but must share a common purpose in support of the selected area of focus
- Must consist of a minimum of one Rotarian team leader and three non-Rotarian team members with no maximum limit of participants
- Have no restrictions on participant age or length of time for training
- Permit one or more teams to travel under each grant

Vocational training teams may have more than one Rotarian participant.
